Visiting Story

On _____ I will be going to Caboolture Art Gallery.

Caboolture Art Gallery is a welcoming place where I can experience artworks by Australian artists and do art activities. The gallery is always free to visit. It is open Tuesday to Saturday from 10 AM to 4 PM. It is closed on public holidays.

Acknowledgement of Country

I will see the Acknowledgement of Country inside the entrance to Caboolture Art Gallery. The gallery is on the land of the Kabi Kabi people. The City of Moreton Bay acknowledges the Kabi Kabi as well as the Jinibara and Turrbal peoples and pays respects to Elders, past, present, and emerging.

The Exhibition

Through the gallery's glass sliding doors, I will find myself in a large exhibition space. The main gallery has one large exhibition space that changes layout for each exhibition. It is a big space with a wooden floor that looks like this.

In the exhibition, *Maximum Madness* I can look at a wide variety of artworks. I can see sculptures, drawings, paintings, videos and installations, all inspired by the *Mad Max* movies!

Maximum Madness explores artworks made by Australian artists, who have created pieces reflecting the themes of Mad Max. This is why I can see art featuring cars, motorcycles, weapons, armour, and more!

I can move through this exhibition in any way I like.

I will take my time to walk around the space and see the works in front of me.

Visual



The lighting in this exhibition is dim. The only lights that are on, shine on the artworks.

One of the video artworks by Shaun Gladwell is projected onto the floor.

The video shows a view of the road from above as a motorcycle zooms along, making the road move quickly under the camera. To get to the rest of the gallery, I need to walk over this video. It might feel a bit dizzy, like being on a ride! If I feel motion sick, I can take another way into the gallery. Here's what the video looks like:

To enter the gallery from the other entrance, I can exit out of the main entrance where I first walked in and go into the Long Gallery activity space. Then, I can walk into the next room called 'The Bunker' and finally into the main gallery. I can also ask a friendly gallery team member for help.

Sounds



The sounds I hear in the exhibition come from the same video artwork projected on the floor. The sounds are of a motorcycle revving and drifting as it speeds down the road.



If loud or unexpected sounds bother me, I can avoid this area and use a different entrance to the gallery, or I can wear noisecancelling headphones.

There are no other loud noises in this exhibition.

Smells



There are no strong smells in this exhibition.

Touch



I cannot touch artworks in the exhibition. If I want to interact with the exhibition, I can go to either the Long Gallery or Focus Gallery space to do activities. These are some photos of what the inside of the gallery looks like, so I can prepare before my visit.




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There are three other spaces where I can go within the gallery.



Long Gallery

The Long Gallery space is interactive, and I can participate in different activities.



Focus Gallery

I can sit and make my own cardboard weapon or device in the Focus Gallery. It can get busy and noisy, especially during school holidays. The quietest times to visit are weekdays in the afternoon (1-3pm). I can also wear noise-cancelling headphones to help me.



The Hub Gallery

The Hub Gallery is located next to the front desk. Local artists show their artworks in here. It is often one of the first places I will visit when I come to the gallery.



Things to do

The gallery hosts lots of different kind or events or activities. Some of the fun things you can go to at the gallery are:

Exhibition openings: These are when the gallery celebrates a new exhibition with morning or afternoon tea, guest speakers and other events depending on what the exhibition is about.

Art workshops: There are different workshops organised for adults and children throughout the year.

Artist talks: The gallery likes to invite experts to come to the gallery and discuss different topics relevant to the exhibitions.

Group tours: The gallery caters for groups to have personal tours of the exhibitions in the different spaces.

Sensory tours: The gallery offers sensory tours that encourage visitors to experience art through all senses, including sight, touch, sound, smell and taste.

I can ask gallery team members for more information about any of these events or check the gallery website.
