Moreton Bay: the living city

Investing in liveability and sustainability as our city grows

We believe our communities are the heart of Moreton Bay. That's why, in the 2024-25 Budget, we're investing in over 40 community events in our jam-packed events calendar.

From signature events like Moreton Kids Festival to favourites such as Jazz & Shiraz and Pooches in the Park, there are plenty of free or low-cost events for the whole family to enjoy.

We're also big on keeping our communities healthy and happy. That's why we're putting \$16.8 million into sports and recreation capital projects. Additionally, initiatives like our Healthy and Active Moreton program, support for local clubs, and investment in state-of-the-art sporting facilities mean it's easier than ever to stay active and connected.

We're also focused on delivering vital infrastructure like roads and active transport to keep the city moving. Planning will continue on major transport corridors to accommodate growth and we will continue to deliver on key projects such as Youngs Crossing Road, the Suttons Beach Pavilion Redevelopment and Caboolture River Road.

We're equally dedicated to sustainability, committing to preserve 75% of the city's landmass as green space and we're helping residents reduce waste by introducing garden organics bins for eligible households. City of Moreton Bay is leading the charge towards a greener, more vibrant future.







THE LIVING CITY UPDATE With Mayor Peter Flannery

We understand the rising cost of living and the challenges faced by our residents. In a Queensland first, we are helping residents with a one-off \$50 financial relief rates concession for eligible owneroccupied residential properties, which will be automatically applied to the first rates bill. We are also boosting our support for small businesses and the rural and agribusiness sector by adding an extra \$1 million to our business support initiatives. These cost-of-living initiatives are fully funded through the sale of our Australian Carbon Credit Units, generated from methane gas captured at our landfill sites. With the new concession applied, the average total rate rise for an owner-occupied residential property equates to just \$1.35 per week. For full transparency, when our garden organics service is introduced in December, the total average residential rate rise including levies equates to \$2.10 per week. So, despite a large increase in land valuations across the city and a cost-of-living crisis, we have minimised rate increases to give back to our residents.

2024-25 Budget invests in our future

We are future-proofing City of Moreton Bay by investing in crucial services and infrastructure to ensure better long-term liveability for residents.

Council's \$922 million budget will deliver a \$277 million capital works program. Here's a snapshot of what's included:



\$88.5M Road and transport networks



\$41.3MParks and the environment



\$80.1MWaste management (inc. waste collection)



\$51.6M 253 road rehabilitation and resurfacing projects



\$29.6MWaterways and coastal areas



\$51.2M Libraries, arts, history, community facilities and cultural activations

Get ready for our new garden organics (GO) service, starting in December.

Did you know that 23% of items currently placed in general waste bins are GO? Eligible households will soon receive a lime green-lidded 240-litre GO bin for easy at-home recycling.

By using this bin for garden waste like grass clippings, branches and leaves, you can help divert 15,000 tonnes of waste from landfill each year. This helps reduce greenhouse gas emissions, supporting our goal of achieving net zero emissions by 2039.



Bray Park flooding

Since the flooding at Bray Park in January, Council officers have been busy repairing our damaged infrastructure and providing assistance to residents affected.

As with any natural disaster, identifying and fixing all of the damaged areas and infrastructure can be a challenging and time-consuming process, so I want to thank you all for your patience while the Council officers continue this work, in addition to their day-to-day duties.

Council has been briefed on the results of a detailed flood mitigation study for Four Mile Creek at Bray Park, which was initiated in response to the Feb 2022 flood event. This study goes into detail on the flood risks along the Four Mile Creek corridor.

The Leone Street drainage construction project to mitigate future events in Bray Park is a priority.

Lobbying efforts to resolve factors outside of Council's control continues. You can rest assured that I will be keeping this event at the forefront of my mind and will keep the community updated.

Youngs Crossing update

The much-anticipated upgrade to Youngs Crossing has passed a major milestone and is now in the final stage of the construction procurement process.

The tender for construction of the new bridge and associated road works has been released to the short-list with submissions closing in August.

Subject to Council approval, it is anticipated the successful contractor will be appointed by the end of the year, with construction expected to be underway early 2025.

The Youngs Crossing Road transport corridor is a critical link to the South East Queensland road network and this upgrade is one of the biggest road infrastructure projects to be delivered by Council and crucial to transport services within our city.

Youngs Crossing early works

Construction of the new road and bridge will require the relocation of some essential utility services, including water, sewer, telecommunication and electricity.

As you travel about, you'll see some sewer and electricity infrastructure being moved during the coming months. Further details about this work will be provided as dates and locations are confirmed with service authorities and the project team will continue to liaise closely with affected properties.

It is expected Youngs Crossing Road and Dayboro Road will remain open to traffic during these works and road users are urged to observe all signage and traffic directions along the route. Some nightworks will be required to minimise disruption to traffic.

The work to remove the roundabout at the intersection of Francis and Sparkes Roads has commenced, beginning with the relocation of the many services that run under the intersection.

Once these service relocations have been completed later this year, the work to remove the roundabout and replace it with a signalised intersection can commence with the project expected to be completed in 2025.
